PART A: ARGUMENTATION (30 MARKS)

Where do you stand on the following issue? Write a simple two-sided argument based on the prompt given below to convince me of your claim.

KUALA LUMPUR (May 10): Prime Minister Tan Sri Muhyiddin Yassin has announced the fourth extension of the movement control order (MCO), currently with loosened restrictions under the conditional MCO (CMCO), for another four weeks from May 13 to June 9.

The period will see several major Malaysian celebrations that usually involve the movement of people, namely Hari Raya Aidilfitri, Kaamatan Festival and Gawai Day.

However, under the CMCO, Muhyiddin stressed that the restrictions on interstate travel still apply. "I know a lot of people are sad that they are unable to 'balik kampung' (go back to hometowns) to celebrate Hari Raya with their families. Be patient. When the situation gets a bit better, you can go back to your hometown to visit your parents and relatives," he said during a televised national address today.

"Although we have made many positive progress in the fight against Covid-19, our efforts have not been completely successful. Further steps still need to be taken to combat this outbreak. In terms of public opinion, I also find that most of the rakyat (people) want the government to continue to take appropriate measures to combat the outbreak," he said.

- (4) reasons in support of the counter claim – a minimum of three [6 marks]
- (5) refutations matching the reasons in support of the counter claim [12 marks]

Marks will be subtracted for internal inconsistency, logical inconsistency, inappropriate use of extraneous material, fallacies, manipulative language and/or rhetorical ploys (minus a maximum of 10 marks).

b) Why is (3a) the best solution? By comparing it to the other two solutions, explain using **FOUR (4)** evaluative criteria.

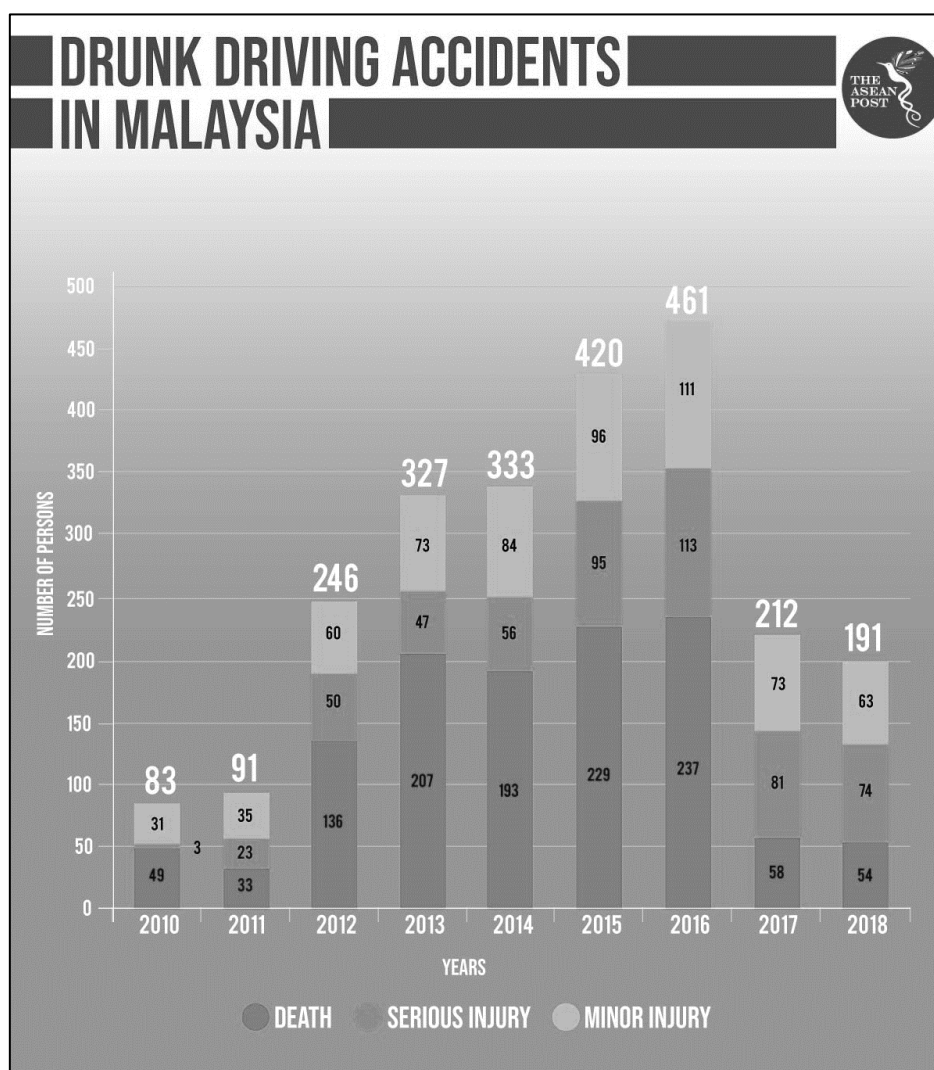
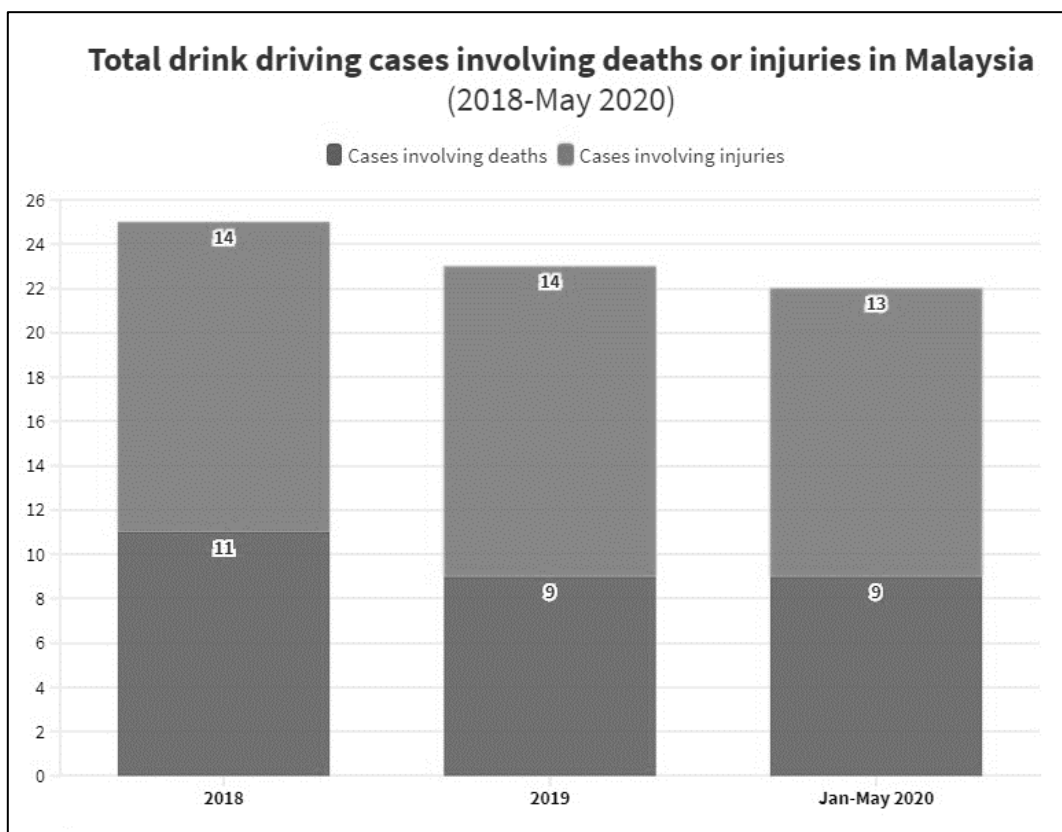

LAW IN MALAYSIA (ROAD TRANSPORT ACT 1987)

Section 45G of the Road Transport Act 1987:

—prescribed limit means—

- (a) 35 microgrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of breath;
- (b) 80 milligrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood; or
- (c) 107 milligrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of urine.

Section 44 (1) of the Road Transport Act 1987:

—incapable of having proper control because of intoxicating liquor or exceed prescribed limits and causing injury or death :

- (a) Jail time 3- 10 years;
- (b) Fine RM8000 (USD2000) – RM20000 (USD 5000); and
- (c) Unqualified for driving license 5 years (1 st time), 10 years 2nd time from date of conviction.
